

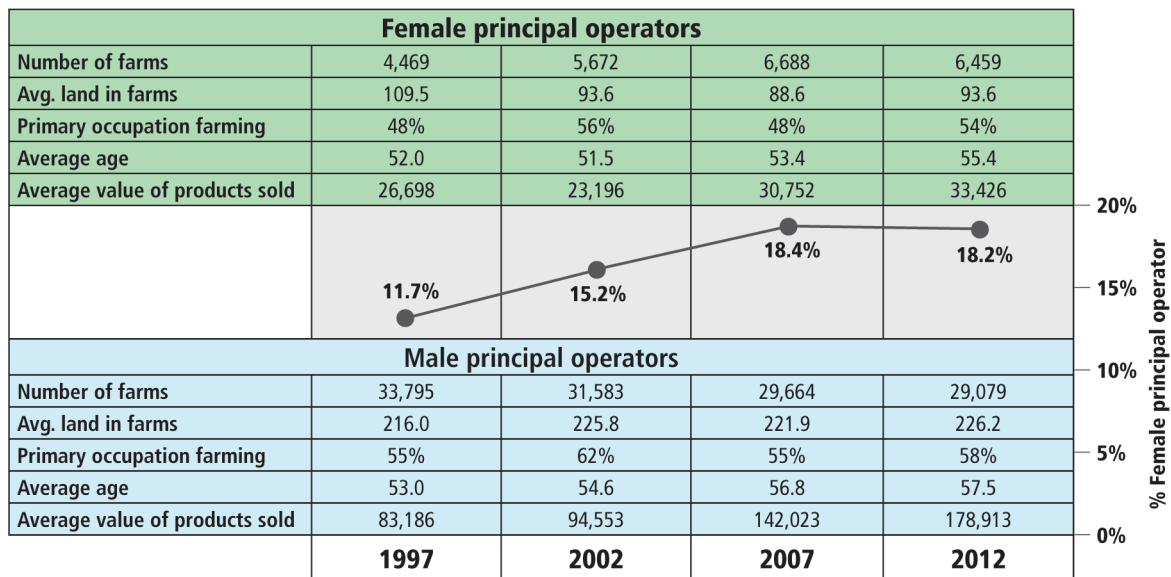

Women Farming in NYS: Trends and comparisons over time

The 2012 Census of Agriculture reveals that U.S. farmers (principal operators) are older, more ethnically diverse, and less likely to be female than five years ago, trends that also hold true in New York State (NYS). While approximately one third of all NYS farm operators are women (33.5% in 2012), they comprise only 18% of "principal operators", that is, the person primarily responsible for daily farm operations. Female principal operators in NYS differ significantly from their male counterparts on several indicators, particularly in the size of farm they run and the average value of products sold. A number of programs across NYS exist to provide training and other resources to support women in agriculture, such as Annie's Project. In cooperation with USDA, Risk Management Agency (RMA), the Northeast Center for Risk Management, and Cornell Cooperative Extension, the New York Annie's' Project extension education team delivers risk management education and training aimed at empowering women in agriculture to become savvy business leaders and partners in today's farming industry. According to co-director Bonnie Collins, women farmers in NYS continue to be an underserved audience. "There is a critical need for education designed specifically for women farmers and to help them manage business risks and enhance the diversity and sustainability of their family farms and communities."

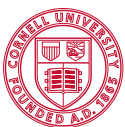
